Last month as we commenced the 2003/2004 fire season, Roger and Wai Davidson came forward with a very generous donation of 12 handheld radios for use by crew during training and emergency incidents

During the last two fire seasons our brigade was involved in fighting major bushfires on the other side of the Grose Valley. With the large amount of radio communication on the RFS network and on fireground

radios, it was difficult to stay in contact with each other as we found when someone was on the end of a hose and out of sight of the truck.

These Radios are an essential tool for our crew to remain in contact with each other during major incidents and when involved in rescues.

HR PRESCRIBED BURNS

Before the rain we did get one burn done at the Southern Fire Trail, however, it did not want to burn properly at the time. A few weeks later, with our planned burns finally authorised, the rain beat us to the punch by three days.

Since that time, the ground has not dried out sufficiently to carry out the burns, and now coming up to the 1st December the weather will be too hot to risk carrying out any hazard reduction.

However, the good news is that with our six HRs approved, the local brigade can decide when to go ahead with the burns in Autumn with only 24 hours notice. Also NPWS have advised that they will be doing 2 large HR prescribed burns to the North and South of Mt Wilson this Autumn

OH&S REPORT

All activities undertaken by Rural fire Brigades such as ours are subject to the legislative requirements of the Occupational Health and Safety (OH&S) Act.

One of the requirements of the Act is for organisations to undertake formal audits of the working environment Audit findings are then tabled and an agreed action plan implemented.

The Mt Wilson shed was assessed in August and a series of recommendations were made.

The major area of concern was the storage of large quantities of fuel inside the shed. The short term solution has been to move most of the fuel outside.

A DA has been submitted to Council for a detached bunded fuel shed which will permanently solve what has been a problem for many years

The reopening of the Village Hall has meant that a lot of bulky furniture item that were previously stored in the Fire Shed have now been returned. This in turn has opened up more space in which to organise and store operational gear.

A similar audit of the Mt Irvine shed is planned for the near future

Is your property prepared for the Fire Season?

I would like to see the property owners of Mt Wilson and Mt Irvine doing a lot more to prepare for fires. Fire preparation will make it a lot safer for our crews to operate on your property and increase the chances of your property surviving a bush fire.

What should you do to prepare your property?

 Have firefighting equipment and water ready.

Equipment:

- Fire Fighting pump, suction line, hoses & nozzles
- Appropriate storz fittings on tank
- Knapsack spray
- Rake hoe
- Buckets
- Sand bags to block down pipes
- Canvas/Tarps to cover and protect items
- Ladder

WANTED

2 Residents from **Mt irvine** and 2 from **Mt Wilson** to provide daily rainfall data to the RFS once a week. If you currently monitor a rainfall gauge and live on the mountains full-time, you can be of great service to the brigade.

Please call Barry Freeman with any questions and to volounteer for this important role $\sqrt{}$ Look after your firefighting equipment and put away after use. (UV sunlight will damage hoses and knapsack sprays if left out for long periods).

√ Ensure equipment is serviceable. Now is the correct time to check; not the hour before a fire impacts your property.

WATER – You need to keep an amount of water dedicated for fire fighting
(I would suggest approx 15.00)

(I would suggest approx 15,00 litres or 3,000 gallons)

√ Set your tank up so that the pick up point for your pressure pump is higher than that of your firefighting outlet and that you do not accidently use up your firefighting water

Have a storz fitting on the tank so the RFS tankers can plumb into it.

> Ensure that you have a fuel reduced zone around your house and sheds.

√ Remove any build up of leaves or bark around buldings, clean gutters, avoid planting trees and shrubs too close to buildings.

Do not stack firewood against buildings or verandahs

Keep grass mown around buildings.

 Construct a firebreak around your property

√ Start by clearing 1.5 m on either side of your fence or boundary line, and if you have a bush area on your block you will also need to clear a fire break 2 or 3 metres between it and the house and garden.

Having cleared firebreaks helps give access to the area and a place to stop the spread of the fire.

> Prepare your house and other buildings against ember attack

Some things to think about are to

 $\sqrt{\text{Ensure gaps in eaves and under floor are filled in.}}$

 $\sqrt{\text{Cover air vents with metal fly mesh.}}$

 $\sqrt{\text{Fit}}$ draught seals to all external doors.

Bushfire CRC

On the 10 December 2002, Federal Science Minister Peter McGauran announced new Commonwealth Government funding of \$25 million for a Bushfire Cooperative Research Centre (CRC). Mr McGauran announced the funding while visiting the Sydney headquarters of the New South Wales Rural Fire Service.

Mr McGauran said the Bushfire CRC would bring together experts from State based fire authorities including the NSW Rural Fire Service, the CSIRO, universities, the Bureau of Meteorology and several other organisations from around Australia to form a vital 'fighting force' to increase understanding of bushfires and how to control them.

"This is the first time that our best researchers and those who undertake the 'on the ground' fire fighting have come together in a national effort to deal with bushfires," Mr McGauran said.

"By bringing together all stakeholders, I am confident the new CRC will provide research that can quickly be applied to assist in the prevention and fighting of bushfires."

"I also welcome international experts in joining our efforts to minimise the devastating effect of bushfires."

The Minister said the coordinated approach of the CRC would assist in ensuring the results of bushfire research were quickly passed on to Australia's fire agencies, land managers and communities.

"The vital results of this research will help all Australians more effectively prepare for and control bushfires and minimise their destructive impact on people, property and the economy."

The Bushfire CRC will begin its work in July 2003 for a seven year period, and have resources totalling some \$100 million, made up of contributions from the Commonwealth Government and all the other CRC participants.

- Be fitted out in full safety Personal Protection Equipment (PPE yellows)
- Be supervised by a field officer at all times
